Cardiac report card published

CCORT Principal Investigator, Dr. Jack Tu, presented key findings contained in the *Quality of Cardiac Care in Ontario* report at a news conference on Jan. 23 in Toronto. Dr. Tu explained how improvements in several care areas could potentially save hundreds of lives in Ontario each year.

The report, based on detailed clinical data on approximately 6,000 AMI and 5,300 CHF patients, is the first from Phase I of the Enhanced Feedback for Effective Cardiac Treatment (EFFECT) study. The study, one of the largest and most comprehensive in the world to measure and improve the quality of cardiac care, is funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research and the Heart and Stroke Foundation.

The report's recommendations for AMI patients include making reperfusion therapy available to more patients, a target "door to needle" time of 30 minutes, lipid testing within the first 24 hours of admission, and use of ASA, beta-blockers, ACE inhibitors and statins at hospital discharge.

CHF patients could have improved outcomes with increased utilization of beta-blocker medications, improved access to and greater utilization of echocardiography to measure LV function, Warfarin therapy in those patients with atrial fibrillation, and counselling on diet, medications, symptoms, daily weights.

"You don't have to be in a large university hospital to achieve these goals," said Brampton cardiologist Milan Gupta, a member of the EFFECT technical advisory committee that reviewed the

quality indicators contained in the report card.

Media broadcast the story on more than 40 radio and television stations across Canada, and national and local newspapers published stories on the study.

St. Joseph's Healthcare Centre's vice-president of clinical programs Darlene Barnes told *The Hamilton Spectator*: "Clearly they've set out some key improvement areas for the whole industry."

The Windsor Star reported that Windsor Regional Hospital's chief of staff, Dr. Gary Ing, said: "The benchmark is pretty high and that will be the new goal for all of us."

Presentations made by CCORT Investigators are raising the profile of the Canadian Cardiovascular Atlas within the medical community.

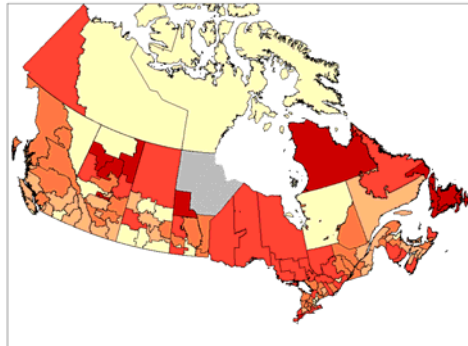

Atlas papers on valve surgery rates and valve surgery outcomes have been submitted to the *Canadian Journal of*

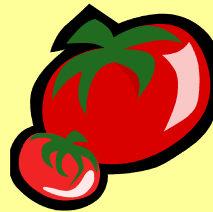
